




Conservation Lands Network

Adaptation: reduce the risks of and adapt to climate change impacts on the environment

Preserving biodiversity in the Bay Area is about protecting lands spanning broad climate gradients:

- Provide "room to move" in response to climate change
- Enhance potential for vegetation shift and species migration




Mitigation: reduce greenhouse gas emissions and enhance carbon sinks

From science to policy

AB 32 – 2006 – put reduction goal into law

SB 375 – 2008, Steinberg – 18 MPOs:

- set targets for reducing transport emissions
- develop Sustainable Communities Strategies as a part of RTPs

Includes state mandated local programs:

- General plan housing elements, rezoning
- CEQA streamlining for smart growth projects
- "some" funding for conservation targets
