

What is Residence Park?

Detached, single-family houses Garden landscape Lot setbacks No cheap houses No commercial buildings No Japanese, Chinese or African **Americans**







Uniform set backs, sidewalk design



Common features:

- Exclusively residential
- Only single-family (except Jordan Park)
- Detached houses
- Architectural controls over house size, fences, etc.
- Entrance pillars (not extant Jordan Park)
- Landscaping
- Deed restrictions to enforce the features and racial homogeneity
- Nearby public transportation to downtown

Additionally some had:

- Private mini parks
- Public statuary
- Staircases
- Fountains
- Curvilinear street design
- Clubhouse
- Playgrounds

What does it mean?

Something new in SF

Intentional communities of strangers

Suburban amenities and social exclusivity

Public spaces provided residents opportunities to socialize

Remoteness willingness to work together common goals.

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
