

9 Ideas for Addressing Oakland's Housing Crunch

accommodating the projected population
influx that the growing tech sector brings.



Harrison Fraker, Professor of Architecture, UC Berkeley College of Environmental Design



- Create more density in Oakland, ideally 65 units per acre.
   "Fitting more people on a given piece of land makes housing more affordable."
- 2. Build more one-bedroom apartments, each 500 square feet and suitable for two people at a cost of \$184,000 per unit affordable for workers making \$20 an hour.

3. Advocate for "public benefit zoning." City of Oakland can use its power over land-use regulation and zoning to extract concessions from developers who benefit from changes in city policy.



4. Tweet City Councilmembers with the hashtag #HousingFeeNow. Since public money made the land usable, those profiting from the land should share some of that profit with the public.

 Utilize public-private partnerships to build large projects, especially around BART stations and other transit stops.

**6.** Encourage co-living as a way to increase density and reduce housing costs by sharing common spaces. For example, OpenDoor established a co-living space at a 5,000-square-foot house where 10 to 15 people live together.
