- Federal and State aid declining, down from 21% of total budget to 10%
- Sales Tax is declining
- Prop. 13 & Prop. 218 limits cities tools
- State population growth is higher in cities
- Cities must respond to citizens' demand for a greater array of services
- Public Safety spending is up








2016-2017 Proposed Budget – General Fund Uses by Category



- \$17.1 million in FY 2016-2017 (Up 15.8%)
- Structure
 - 40% General Fund
 - 30% Fund 536 (Convention Center Operating)
 - 15% Convention & Visitors Bureau
 - 15% Arts
- Additional 4% to fund expansion of Convention Center.




Why does San Jose always seem broke?










