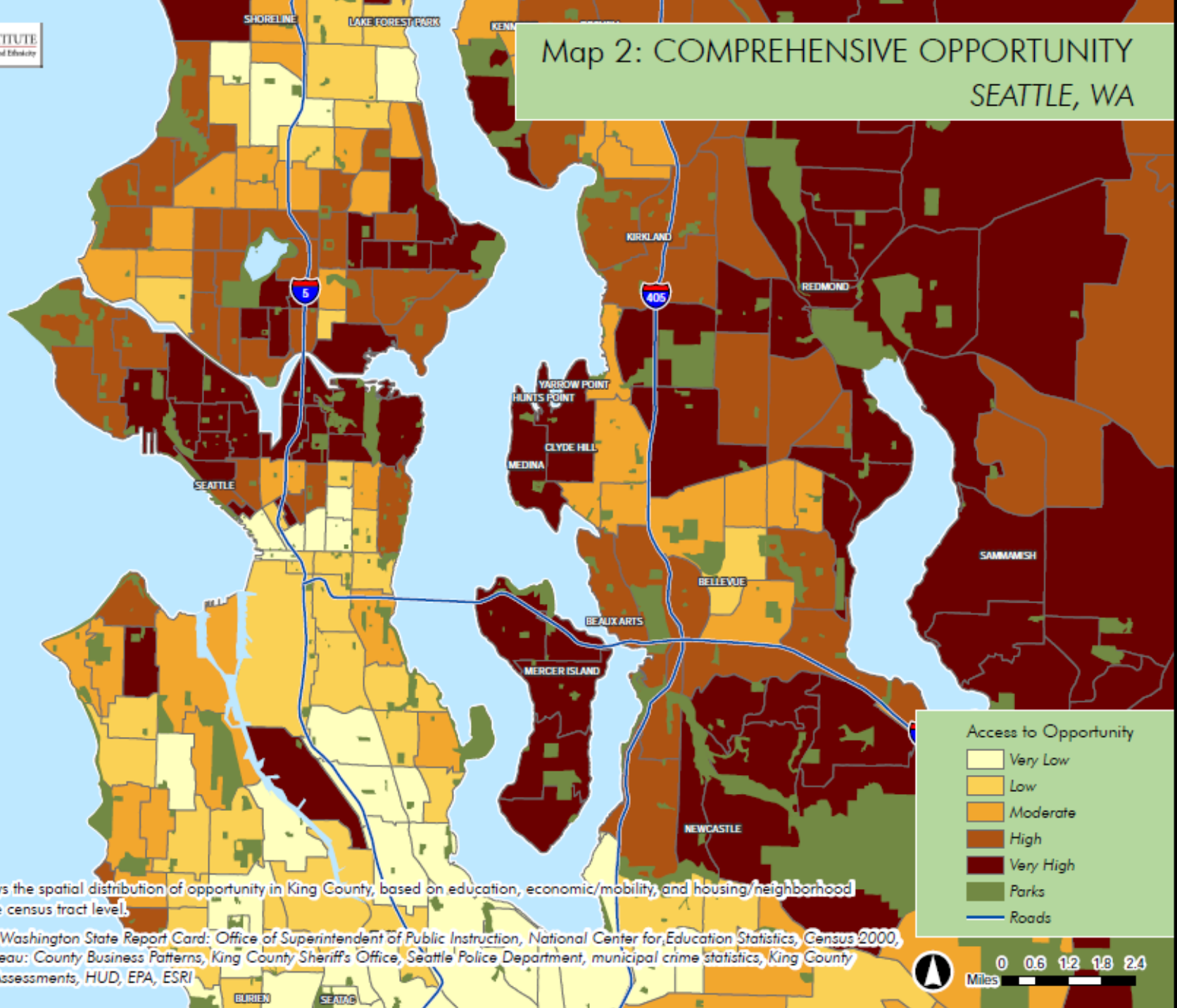

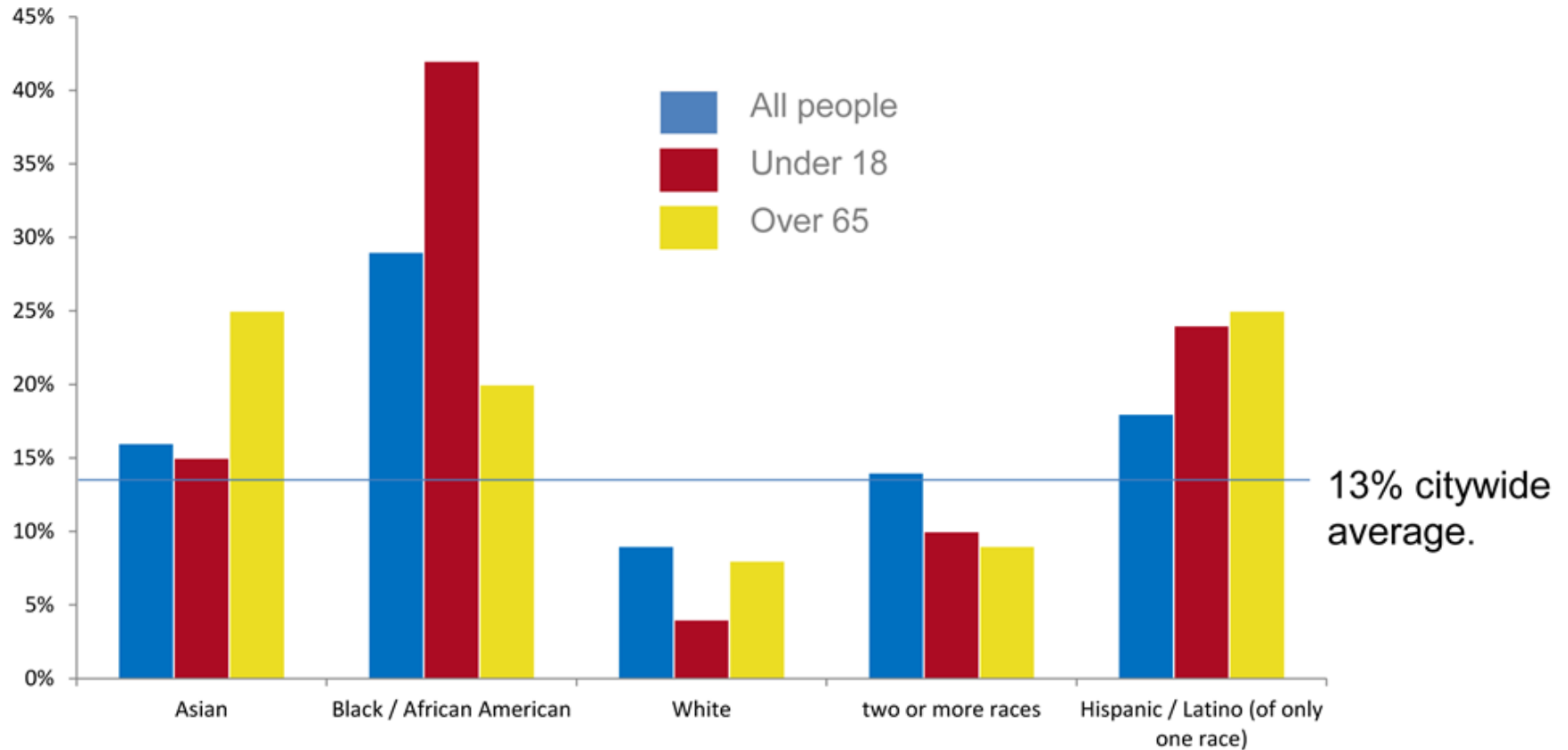

The Dominant Narrative

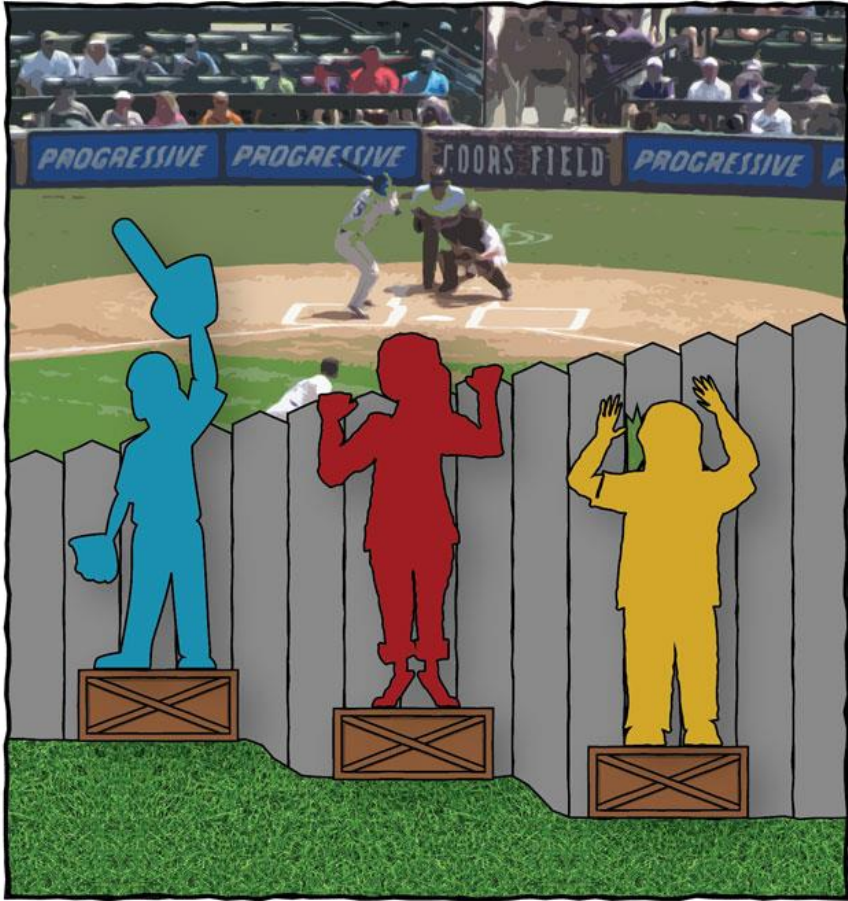
“This [dominant] narrative will always produce durable, persistent and racialized poverty; built around just accepting and tolerating this societal problem by framing it as an individual issue.”

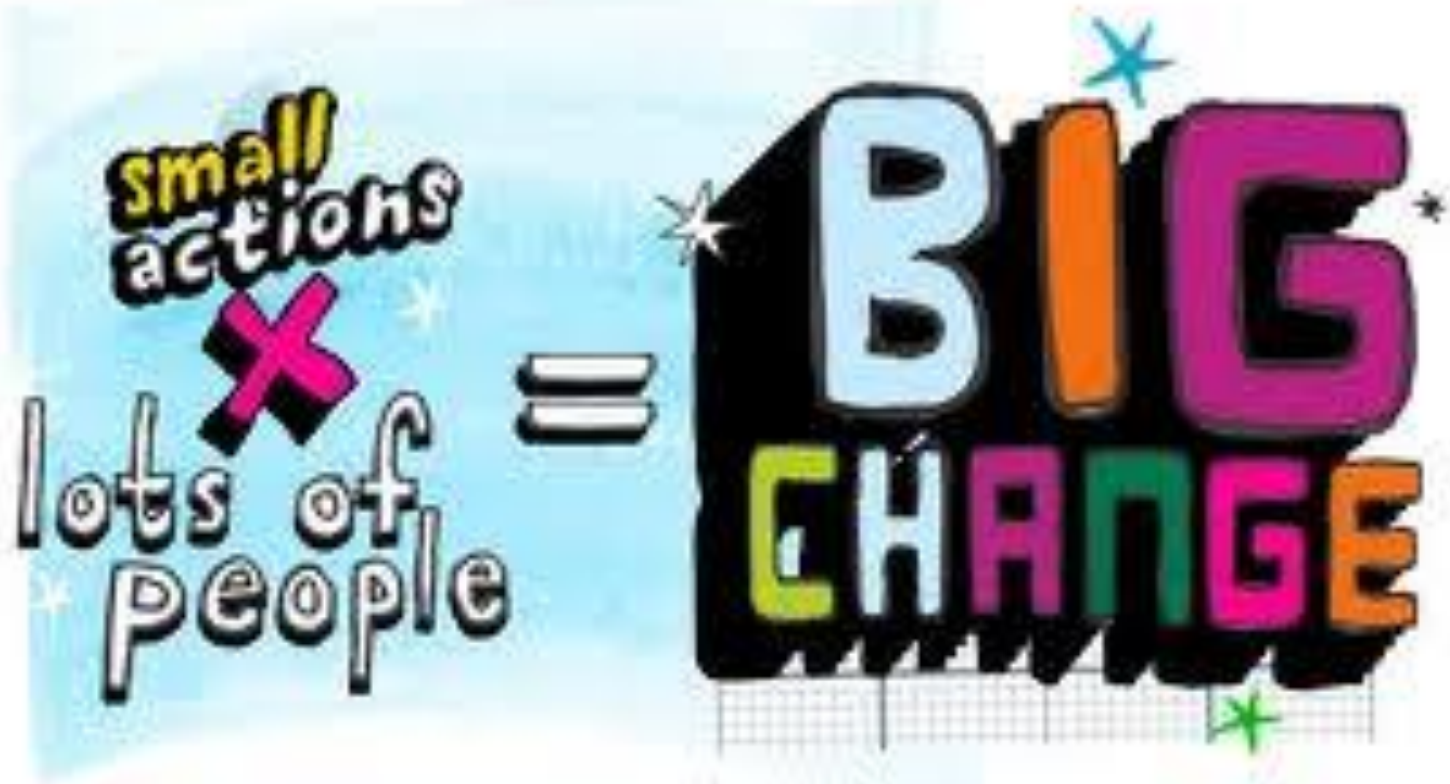
