


Cities are much like a human body.




With the body, "a heart" and a circulation system proportioned to each other.




The Bay Area was born different, with 2 hearts of roughly the same size.




Originally Oakland grew largely separate from San Francisco ...




with its own dominant heart for jobs, retail, institutions and public engagement for most of its residents.




As San Francisco became dominant, Oakland was left with an equally sized downtown, but far fewer regionally significant commerical uses.




Bridges, tunnels and suburbanization made matters worse resulting in Oakland's perpetual Retail Leakage, the worst in US.







Over the years, there were many valiant efforts to put Oakland on an equal footing ...







... including routing BART to directly connect the two Main Streets.




Today,. the question still remains whether the Bay Area's second Heart...




... should be allowed to become predominantly another area of housing.



A dual core offers the potential greater long-term shared prosperity with an overall larger number of more cosmopolitan jobs than could otherwise be possible.




To do so, we must avoid further aggravating the region's jobs/housing strain...




... by better connecting housing within the region ...
