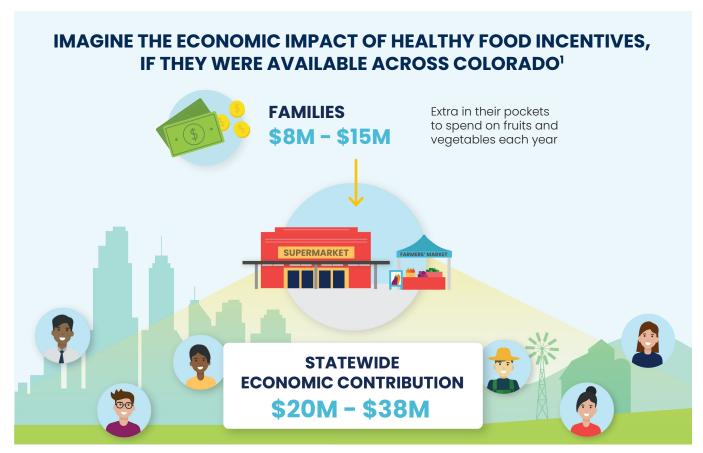
EXPANDING HEALTHY FOOD INCENTIVES ACROSS COLORADO
