## **Dear Supervisors:**

We, the undersigned, respectfully request that you pass a budget that fully adopts the recommendations of the Sugary Drink Distributor Tax Advisory Committee (SDDTAC) for fiscal years 2022-23 and 2023-24.

The anticipated \$10.6 million in unallocated soda tax revenue and the SDDTAC's recommendations for how to spend those funds represent an important opportunity to progressively target the revenue from the soda tax to improve the health of populations that are disproportionately impacted by soda consumption and diet-related disease. This was the focus of the SDDTAC during its deliberations. Many of us attended the committee's meetings and can attest to the robust public comment from members of the community, attention to detail and indepth discussion of various alternatives by the sixteen member advisory committee.

Mayor Breed's proposed budget currently reduces or fully cuts funding across six of the seven funding categories identified by the SDDTAC. These cuts are then reallocated to the Recreation and Parks Department "Requity" program at nearly three times the committee's proposed amount. For a chart detailing the differences between the SDDTAC's recommendations and the Mayor's proposed budget see the analysis produced by the committee, "Mayor's FY 2022-23 and 2023-24 Sugary Drink Distributor Tax Allocation and SDDTAC Recommendations", attached to this letter.<sup>2</sup>

We strongly support the recommendations of the SDDTAC not only because they would provide funding to programs that improve community health with an equity lens, but also because it is important that the soda tax revenue be spent in a way that is guided by the committee established by voters when the tax was passed at the ballot in 2016. Respecting the committee's recommendations builds trust among the community and ensures public support for the soda tax into the future.

We respectfully ask that you incorporate 100% of the SDDTAC's allocation recommendations into your budget and that you will continue to support the committee as it tracks implementation and expenditure of the tax revenue.
