Background: COVID-19 State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds

- The COVID-19 State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (SLFRF) established by ARPA provided cities and counties in the Bay Area \$3 billion in flexible resources to lay the foundation for a strong and equitable recovery.
 - These funds could go towards public sector revenue replacement, essential worker pay, public health and economic impacts of the pandemic, and infrastructure investments.
 - These resources offer a unique opportunity for regional leaders to make targeted investments to advance racial equity by addressing the needs of Black and brown communities harmed most by the pandemic, and systemic barriers that preceded it.

Preview: Bay Area Recovery Dollars Tracker

- In early March we will launch the Bay Area Recovery Dollars Tracker, a new tool from PolicyLink, developed in collaboration with the Community Advisory Committee
- The tool will give us the full picture of how Bay Area communities used these funds. It will also highlight calls to action on the lessons learned through the process, and how to deploy the remaining resources.

• A few highlights:

- There are still resources on the table. Local governments still have an opportunity to leverage federal funds to support the communities of color that have been the most harmed by COVID as well as address the systemic inequities that existed long before the pandemic.
- There are many bright spots to lift up- and to sustain after these funds go away
- Some investments have not met the need. Less than one percent of the resources allocated to date went to targeted, BIPOC-owned inclusive business development.
- Ongoing, resourced, multi-issue budget advocacy capacity is critical- it needs to exist before a crisis.
